Mrs Simpson then chose scenes that would fit the ideas and feelings in the songs. Shakespeare is so universal that it was uncanny how she could find scenes that would appeal to an audience and work with the songs they had chosen. The show used much of Shakespeare's original language for its rhythms, although some archaic words were modernised so that the audience did not need to know the plays to understand what was going on. Six Shakespearean scenes were chosen, including classics such as the balcony scene from Romeo and Juliet, the mechanicals from A Midsummer Night's Dream, and the banishment of Cordelia from King Lear.

A group of narrators together held the whole show. Several Year 13 Drama students were responsible for writing these scenes and they had a great energy about them.

Students were very hands on in this production, running lighting, managing backstage and playing in the show band.

Maths & Science Week

13th – 17th Aug

This was a major event of the year for the Maths and Science committee as it involved significant planning, organising, and carrying out of the activities. The purpose of Maths & Science Week was to explore aspects of Maths & Science that aren't generally covered in a traditional classroom. It allows students to look at STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering & Mathematics) from a different perspective and increases interest in the field. Four activities were organised this year. Firstly, was The Amazing Race, where students were required to complete tasks around school such as Tetris, a Maths question and flying paper planes. A Forensic Science "Murder Mystery" was an activity where students had to investigate the "murder" of the Head Girl by analysing footprints to determine gender and some hair samples. We had the classic "Eggcellent" Egg Drop, where students were given a plastic bag, straws, tape, cotton and zip lock bags to make a parachute for an Egg before dropping it from a set height. Many Physics principles were considered for this activity. Our last activity was the Fantastic Floaty Boats where the girls were given 20 popsicle sticks, blue tack and a zip lock bag to create a boat-like structure. The winners were determined on the boat's buoyancy and ability to hold the largest amount of weight. We finished the week off with an informal prize giving ceremony, where winners and helpers were awarded "Nobel Prizes" for their extraordinary work and involvement. Practical Applications

In June this year our 1MATS girls were completing a Measurement topic which involved calculating speed and measuring distance. They were lucky enough to be able to see the real-world applications of this for one afternoon when we had a visit from the police! Rob Keen, one of the Serious Crash Investigation Team came in to show the girls how he measures speed and distance. The girls could use radar guns to measure how long it took them to walk a set distance, walk while reading and riding a bike. Students were also given the opportunity to measure the speed of the cars on Northgate using the radar gun on unsuspecting passing motorists. The girls thoroughly enjoyed being able to see how the work they were doing in the classroom is applied and useful within a practical context.

Competitions

Once again some of our outstanding students have gained significant results from a variety of competitions. In particular: Breanna Camden, Mercy Jones and Holly Stoddart. The benefits of entering these competitions are that students can: test their general mathematics knowledge against students from all over New Zealand; receive individual feedback on each question; track their progress over the years they enter and receive recognition for their efforts and achievements. Every student will at least receive a certificate of participation.

2018

has been a settled year for the Science Department and our focus has been on embedding our senior curriculum, reviewing junior programmes and implementing our 2018 strategic plan. We started the year fully staffed and were pleased to have Mrs. Claire Hodson return from maternity leave.

We have continued to support our students learning of science with our 'Tuesday tutorials', which is part of our department's strategic plan to help raise student's achievement. A range of science staff attend the tutorials which are open to all students during lunchtime. Science students can attend these tutorials for homework help, revision and one-on-one tuition. The support shown by staff has been wonderful and I thank all involved.

We have been fortunate to be the recipients of a generous donation from the L. A. Alexander Trust. The funds will be used to purchase a projector and document camera. The trust also continues to support the employment of a student to assist with horticulture / agriculture activities during the year.

The Science Department has had students involved in several local community-based events. We sent a group of five students to New Plymouth Boys' High School to listen to the Hochstetter Lecture, given by Emeritus Professor Alan Cooper from Otago University on the Alpine fault and geology. I would like to thank Dr. Sian Fayle for accompanying our students. We sent several Year 9 and 10 Maori Rangatahi to a fun and interactive science Expo organised by WhyOra along with the support of Victoria University and Western Institute of Technology. This was a full day of exhibitions from tertiary providers and is set up to inspire, engage and encourage our Rangatahi to continue with Science throughout their secondary school education enabling a wider range of career options beyond school. I would like to thank Kimiora Taite for accompanying our students. The Taranaki Science and Technology Fair is always a popular event and we managed to enter a good number of high quality projects with 14 of our students earning significant prizes. I would like to

thank Mr. Athol Hockey for his time and effort in organising this event.

We had several students attend the 2018 New Zealand University summer camps which are held in January each year. There have been a significant number of students applying for the various 2019 positions which are always an amazing opportunity as they open the world of science and scientific research up to our students in a way that complements what we aim to achieve in school.

Arsheen Hasolkar and Anahita Piri were selected to attend the Rotary National Science and Technology Forum in Auckland. This is an annual event conducted by Rotary and the Tertiary Institutions of Auckland, to enable students to gain understanding of the tertiary courses available and a fuller appreciation of science and technology in the wider community. The Forum is a programme designed for high achieving students in Science and Mathematics.

Hazel McLaren-Swift and Anahita Piri were selected to attend The Elaine P Snowden Astronomy School which is a 5-day astronomy camp in Christchurch and Tekapo. Students attending the camp meet other like-minded people who share their passion for astronomy and astrophysics. The school includes astronomy classes, workshops, and seeing the largest optical telescope in New Zealand.

This year we selected Isabelle Roberts (Year 12) to represent our school at the Foundation for International Space Education in Houston Texas. We are very privileged to be able to send a student to Houston each year. The selection process is rigorous, and the candidates are always selected from our top academics.

Anahita Piri was selected by the Royal Society to represent New Zealand at the Asia Science Camp in Manado, Indonesia. This was an amazing opportunity for one of our students to interact with like-minded students and meet many Nobel Laureates and world-class researchers. Anahita had the opportunity to engage on plenary sessions, round table discussions and student master classes, which all encourage deeper thinking

about science and scientific knowledge.

For the first time this year we have entered a team in the NZ Young Physicist Tournament in Wellington. The team consisted of Donna Luo, Anahita Piri, Hazel McLaren-Swift and Kaylee Frost. Our students placed 4th out of ten teams which is a remarkable achievement for our first time. Our students received a special commendation on their efforts and sportsmanship. I would like to thank Mr. Andrew Chubb for his time and efforts preparing our students for the competition, including organising the trip.

Our Year 13 Science leader for 2018 was Arsheen Hasolkar. I would like to thank her for all the work that she has done to promote science throughout the year. I observed large numbers of students participating in the ICAS Science Quiz and the lunchtime events during science week, all organised by Arsheen and her support team -great job! Arsheen has also provided opportunities for many students to earn their Mathematics and Science Badge, which is an award that students work towards throughout the year by participating in a variety of extra-curricular events offered by both the Mathematics and Science Departments. The purpose of this award is to:

- Promote involvement in Science & Math based activities within the school.
- Increase the profile of Science and Math in the school.
- Make Science and Math activities more accessible to all people and levels.
- Encourage students with an interest in these areas to pursue STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering & Mathematics) subjects and counteract the large gender imbalance in these industries.

It is here that the shape, form, use and assembly of materials along with ergonomics are important. The art gallery design is supported by the completion of a set of formal working drawings and an architectural mechanical perspective drawing to showcase the final outcomes.

Our Year 13 DVC commences their year with a focus on an external achievement standard; Initiate Design Ideas. This utilises skills, knowledge and divergent design around a theme/s. In short, the students explore their chosen themes by research, sketching, drawing, modelling, film to generate design possibilities. The outcomes are used, applied and integrated into their spatial design assignment. This includes design prompts around the small house movement, sustainability, discernible use of materials, practical building form and so on. It is endeavoured that these experiences prepare our students of DVC for further study beyond secondary school into university and other areas of tertiary study.

In Year 9 DVC we focus on what DVC is and what skills we can use to express our ideas with. This naturally includes the design process, sketching, drawing and the means to enhance and present work such as colour, rendering and shading. As DVC has two main areas of focus; product and spatial and consequently the design of a twenty first century watch or time piece and the research and design of a favourite room or space have been the design projects that we have pursued during our 'taster semesters'.

In Year 10 DVC we focus on an initial product design project, building on knowledge and skills such as sketching, applying visual value such as detail and considering design factors such as ergonomic fit, size, scale and proportion. Students render their final 3D product design so that they can achieve credits towards NCEA Level 1 DVC. The next assignment was to

create an interior design. The students apply their skills and knowledge of colour, lighting, space and texture.

The Year 11 DVC had an initial focus on the study of a known and successful designer. The result was for the students to use and apply the influence of that designer to their own work. This was achieved through the two major projects; the lighting solution-product design project and the I-Site building architectural design. It's here that students express their creativity via freehand sketching, drawings, notes, colour and detail.

In Year 12 DVC there is a change of direction in that students choose a design era or design movement to influence their work. The first major work is to design a small art gallery showing this influence. The external form and architectural elements can reflect some of the influence by careful application of

digital technology (hard materials)

Hey everyone! I'm Crystal, and I was a part of the NCEA Level 1 Design Technology class. I have been interested and involved with Design Technology ever since my first year (Year 9) and have been enjoying the craft ever since!

Design Technology is all about creativity and is very hands on in the workshop. Each project teaches you different and useful skills for later in life - building, designing, machinery, carving and even drawing skills! With Mr. Marnoch, teacher in charge of Design Technology, you are guaranteed to craft something you will love, and have a great time building - not to mention that you keep all projects you make!

Year 9, will give you a 10-week rotation of Design Technology to experience. The projects you make are short and quick, but very creative. You make a wooden container with cartoon characters on the front, pendants/jewelry, and models of your own dream bedroom. In Year 10, bigger and more exciting projects such as a sea chest, shelving units and jewelry boxes. This is the year where the bookwork prepares you for the next year. In Year 11, things get more serious, but still as creative and crafty as before. This is the year many students begin NCEA work and create long term projects, such as coffee tables and storage units. Portfolio work is also heavily involved. Year 12 is similar to Year 11, but is NCEA Level 2, and you create big sea chests, a scale model of a Coffee Shop, and portfolio work. Year 13 must be the most hardworking, but well rewarding year. You create a furniture piece of your choice (in the past, students have made projects like a pool table and a recliner chair) and a scale model of a beach shack.

All in all, it's a great class to be involved in, and is perfect if you want to pursue a career in engineering, architecture, tradesmen work, machinery, and so much more!

Thank you to Mrs. Coleman who taught Year 12 Geography for the first time. I appreciate your valued input and support to gain positive learning outcomes and achievement for the students.

We are excited to see an increase in numbers at all levels in 2019 and continue to encourage our students in Geography as future leaders to look at a more sustainable approach to our lives. 2018 has been a busy and productive year and with the development of ongoing changing methods of teaching and learning due to eLearning and technological developments, Geography is a very important subject for students to still understand that the physical and social (human) environment is a cultural taonga for all.

Geography field trips: Keeping it Local. This year we offered local field trips to complete the internal inquiry assessments at all senior levels to allow students to investigate how Geography operates in our community.

The Level 1 class continued to test and assess the human impacts along our main Awa in New Plymouth – The Waiwhakaiho River. We continue to investigate the level of pollution along the river from the mountain to the river mouth. The girls gain different skills and insight including scientific testing, analytical, research reporting and applying key Geography concepts.

The Level 2 class spent a day exploring the different residential developments and properties around the city looking at factors affecting housing demand and property values as well as the different housing designs and features over time. The students were also visited by Zay Griffith from Harcourts who provided valuable insight into the changing shape of residential land use. The Level 3 class research continued to explore how Coastal Development has changed over time and has impacted the environment. As a way of assessing this change we choose to bike along the walkway from school to Bell Block then to the Aquatic Centre and back to school. Due to the low demand for the Thailand trip for 2019, we plan to offer a trip to Rotorua for 2 nights in Term 3 so the students can understand the impacts and consequences of Tourism development in an area.


HoD English

- Giving students the opportunity to develop an understanding about the range of employment options available to them.
- Providing students with clear pathway direction so they are making the right choices for their future planning.

Career education is provided in a variety of vocational programmes that include: classroom-based courses STAR (Secondary Tertiary Alignment Resource), Gateway courses where students attend work experience one day a week for approximately a term, Trades Academy where students attend WITT, one day a week, in a course related to their career choice which provides core generic Unit Standards and one day a week attending a WITT course related to the student's career choice, and 3 + 2 which gives students two days attending a WITT course and three days of school. Other short-term opportunities include: Retail courses, Red Shirts in Schools, WhyOra Maori Health Programme run at the Taranaki Base Hospital, Health & Safety in the Workplace and First Aid courses, to name a few.

Initiatives the Careers Department intend to implement in 2019:

- Enlarge the network of tertiary providers at our annual mini Careers Expo
- Continue to develop the self-awareness and strength finder profile for each individual student to enable them to recognise their natural career pathway
- Continue to develop the career information centre to provide for a wide range of potential opportunities for students, including implementing a Job Fair annually.
- To forge closer links with outside organisations and companies such as Todd Energy, Taranaki District Council, New Plymouth Port, Taranaki Base Hospital, Worley and Parsons (Engineering) with the aim of providing students with insights into their chosen pathway

In summary, I would like to acknowledge all the dedication and hard work of our career development team, Mrs. Lofton-Brook, Whaea Kimiora Taite, Ms. Young, and Mrs. Cleaver, who work tirelessly behind the scenes to provide so many wonderful opportunities outside, and within the class room setting to explore and evaluate students' career pathways.

The Careers Team wish all Leavers a successful and satisfying future. We acknowledge that the success we experience is very much due to the positive support for careers activities from our Principal, Ms. Kerr, Senior Management, Heads of Departments, Deans and Subject Teachers. Career development for students here encompasses all that is offered at NPGHS and with this approach together, we can achieve positive career progress for our students.

LEARNING SUPPORT SERVICES

2018 saw a major change in direction for the Awhina Learning Support team because at the start of this year some of our Awhina staff and students were amalgamated into the Waimarie unit. Three teacher aides and six high needs ORS (Ongoing Resourcing Scheme) funded students left Awhina to join the Waimarie team as the number of students at Waimarie had declined to three. This means that Awhina House is now centered on providing learning support for students in main stream classes. Because of this alteration in focus, in 2019 our name will change from Learning Support Services to the Awhina Learning Centre.

This year we have successfully moved from working with the Year 9 and the Year 10 Awhina groups to providing small group and/or individualised learning programmes as the needs of students arise. Joan McLellan, our dedicated and adept Learning Support teacher, provides stimulating one on one individual tuition for students who require help for literacy as well as numeracy. She also continues to use her expert skills to support many of our junior students in their Math classes. We have also successfully trialed a new computer based reading programme called Reading Plus. This programme will become an integral part of our work next year as it benefits both junior and senior students by improving their reading comprehension and their reading speed while also enhancing their academic vocabulary.

Our senior SPEC students have also had a successful year with most of our 1SPEC girls really stepping up and gaining over 19 NCEA credits. They deserve to be commended for persevering and sticking with the tasks set by the Instant unit standards which they must complete to achieve their NCEA credits.

The list of our senior students approved by NZQA for Special Assessment Conditions (SAC) for the NCEA examinations has increased to 38 this year. We are successfully using a series of Lucid computer tests for testing students who may have reading, writing or processing difficulties and who may, therefore, be entitled to SAC support. These tests are now also used at all levels to ascertain whether students have dyslexic tendencies.

Earlier this year we were very fortunate to be able to employ Deepti Khanolkar as a teacher aide. She has joined our awesome teacher aide team which includes Sharon Church, Chris Goldsworthy, Glenda Kerr, Kirsten Probyn and Jenny Saunders.

To all the Learning Support team thank you for all your hard work, your dedication and your professionalism. Thank you for continuously supporting our girls to ensure they each have had a successful year. I also would like to thank all the girls we have worked with over the year. Every one of our girls should feel proud of her achievements. In closing I would like to thank our Line Manager, Ms. Kerry Macdonald for her genuine, ongoing support of our Awhina staff and students. Kia Kaha. Best wishes to you all for 2019.

HoD Learning Support



The Waimarie staff & students have experienced a significant year of growth and evolution this year. The Waimarie unit has traditionally provided specialised education for our ORS students with very high, complex needs. ORS is an abbreviation for the Ministry of Education funded Ongoing Resourcing Scheme for students with high and very high special needs. At the end of 2017 several Waimarie students transitioned on to their lives beyond school. This role change created space in the unit for five students to relocate from the Learning Support Department to become based in Waimarie. Therefore, it has been a year of massive transition for us. Flexibility is now our middle name! We have redesigned the space, shared resources, learnt to accommodate each other and come together for shared learning experiences. We have developed two

wai marie



new programmes that operate alongside each other and cater to the vastly different needs of the students. As a result, our two "original" Waimarie students have benefitted from the stimulation that the five chatty, dancing, singing "new" students bring to the unit. While at the same time, our "new" students have learnt a great deal about acceptance, communication and leadership through their interactions with the "original" students.

A huge part of the Waimarie philosophy is to empower the students. Whether it is gaining work skills out of the classroom, deciding what lunchbox items you have the appetite for, achieving credits through the correspondence school, commanding a horse, preparing a hot meal or using "eye point" to indicate a preference... across the wide spectrum of abilities that our students present, we push them to have autonomy and independence. Some of our students attend and thrive in mainstream classes and we appreciate the efforts made by teachers to provide differentiated work and assisting our students to feel included. Our Inclusive Dance programme led by Dance teacher Suzee Freeman provides a creative and liberating opportunity for our students to access quality teaching and facilities. Four students have gained real confidence independently attending a WITT Star Course one day a week all year, students attend Riding for the Disabled, we have a weekly trip to the Aquatic Centre and students exercise at the Sport Taranaki Moveables Gym session in Strandon. We have been sailing on the Waitara river with the highly competent volunteers from Sailability. We have been victorious Boccia and swimming champions at the Special Olympics and starred in a street performance at Pop UP Womad. We have been regulars

on the bus, at the Museum and Centre City. We have visited the park, airport and Len Lye Centre. Education outside the classroom is pivotal to helping our students become well rounded and adventurous.

The unit is functioning at capacity with eight full time school students, as well as five adult students from Toucan Taranaki that each attend one day a week. Students receive a mixture of intensive one to one support as well as larger group lessons with both a teacher and dedicated, skilled team of teacher aides. The learning in the unit is holistic, catering for students specific physical, health and developmental needs. This includes sensory work, communication skills and emotional intelligence. Preparing our students to transition into their adult lives is essential, so learning life skills is a key focus of our program. Numeracy is embedded into class work as well as meaningful real-life scenarios such as regular supermarket shopping, cooking and town trips. Our literacy learning is essentially about communication, recreation and information gathering. We endeavour to foster life - long learners. Students are practicing core vocab, decoding text, googling, documenting their own experiences, reading instructions, forming opinions and singing the odd karaoke song. It may sound simple – but for students with speech and processing challenges, this is our core business.

The Arts are a valued part of our programme and a week doesn't go by without some painting, drumming, dancing and drama providing enrichment for our students. Our sensory garden is experiencing an overhaul but is still a highly prized asset, providing inspiration for our Puanga/ Matariki celebration, when we harvested our own vegetables and made copious amounts of soup. In fact, horticulture has been a key interest for our senior student Thomas Prentice. As well as being a mighty good bean grower, Thomas has come to the end of his time at school this year after eight years in the unit. Thomas has been our "deep thinker" and is a very sensitive soul. It has been a pleasure to see him grow (quite literally... as he is really tall!), but to see him develop into an amazing young man. Having NPBHS students as part of our whanau is an absolute privilege. Our students are the life force of the unit and we thank them for a great year. In particular: Olivia for her humour, Marla for her passion, Taryn for her strength, Simone for her dancing, Helaina for her voice, Chloe for her smiles and Michelle for her leadership. Ms. Kerry Macdonald has been a fantastic support for the whole team and we really appreciate her continuous aroha for Waimarie. Last but by no means least, a huge thank you must be extended to our incredible team of Teacher Aides who have been resilient, compassionate and hardworking (not to mention spectacular dancers!).

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nzss adventure racing | new zealand secondary schools

On Friday April 13th, myself, and 7 New Plymouth Girls' High School Year 12 and 13 students traveled over Havelock North, to a place called Camp David, where we would compete in the 2018 GO412 Youth Adventure Race, also known as the National Adventure Racing Champs. GO412 is a 12-hour long adventure race for high school students, where have 12 hours to complete the course, gathering as many checkpoints as they can, through stages such as mountain biking, rafting, trekking and navigation. Upon arrival, we set up our tents, and met up with the rest of the wider adventure racing squad from New Plymouth Boys' High School. Before we knew it, it was briefing time, and we were warned of the big race we had ahead of us, including a massive 19km paddle in rafts made from tyre tubes and bamboo poles. After one last gear check, we all headed to bed, aware that a good night's sleep would be needed for our 4am wake up. The following day, Saturday April 14th, we woke up at 4am, nervously shoving down breakfast, ready for the race start at 6am. My team consisting of Caterina Poletti, Jody Rawlinson, Georgia Bricknall, and myself, were soon lost among a wave of bodies and headlamps, all rushing to reach the first checkpoint.

Once collecting this checkpoint, which involved Caterina diving head first in to the river to reach it, we continued with the first stage of the race, a run along the river bank, collecting checkpoints as we went. Unfortunately for our team, this stage didn't run quite as smoothly as we had hoped. A missed checkpoint resulted in the team back tracking, losing precious minutes, as well as us being the leading female team. This however only made us more motivated, and we greeted stage 2 of the race with even more intensity than before. This stage was a 19km paddle on rafts, and after shoving down food at transition we set off on the raft, quickly falling in to a fast paddle. 19km later we were finally able to set foot on land again, beginning stage 3, a reasonably short hour or two long trek to get to the transition for the biking leg of the race. This stage went well, and before we knew it, we reached stage 4, the first mountain biking stage. This was a big one, with the riding through paddocks, along gravel roads, and even to the top of an incredibly large hill (some may even say mountain!).

Despite enduring what seemed like an endless climb to get to the check point at the top of the hill, we were still able to keep our spirits, and make it back to transition in time to begin the second to last stage of the race, which was a trek. After venturing up the highest hills, and across swamps and paddocks, we finished the trek, with just enough time to complete

the last leg of the race before it hit 6pm at night, and our 12 hours was up. Stage 6 of the race, the final leg, was a 30km mountain bike along the road to reach the finish line. As a team we were slightly worried we hadn't allowed enough time for this stage, and so we were pushed to our limits, rolling over the endless hills, passing numerous teams as we went. This final push to the finish proved to be worth it, as we reached the finish just before 6pm, and hopefully was the winning female team. The feeling of staggering over the finish line 12 hours later was almost euphoric, with our legs being so exhausted they struggled to hold us up! All the pain we had put our bodies through, both physically and mentally, was worth it, as we had scored the highest amount of points in the girls' category, making our team the National Girls' High School Adventure Racing Champions! This was a title which we had trained incredibly hard for, and achieving it was the icing on top of the cake of a very challenging race.

hillary challenge

Known as the toughest secondary school event in New Zealand, Hillary Challenge is a 5-day event consisting of the top 12 teams from all around the country. We trained as a larger squad over the summer that took us to epic parts of New Zealand through races and expedition trainings in our build up, before the final 8 were chosen just weeks before the event. After months of training we arrived at Tongariro nervous and excited to get going.

Days 1 and 2 saw teams rotating through 12 challenges, each an hour long. These included things such as orienteering in caves, setting up a trampoline system to transport as many bricks as possible, raft paddling through rapids in a figure of 8 and using morse code and sign language to answer geographical questions. We felt we'd had a mixed day 1 and 2 with some activities we did well in while others not so great. We were stoked to discover we were in 2nd place by 92 points to Whangarei at the beginning of day 3.

Days 3 and 4 consisted of a two-day rogaine, where teams collect as many checkpoints as possible from the 72 on the map given, travelling by foot with large packs and gear to camp out that night. This year the terrain took us over areas of the Tongariro Crossing and around Upper/Lower Tama Lakes, finishing at the Chateau. We pushed super hard for these two days knowing we had to in order to




