Term 4 has come around fast as we begin to welcome the signs of summer and look forward (hopefully) to a Christmas and New Year free from Covid disruptions. At the beginning of the year the Board made some refinements to the strategic plan in place for the school and were well-supported by the school's Senior Leadership Team (SLT) through their development of the annual goals. The school's annual goals focused on our three strategic priorities: Hauroa (wellbeing), Ako (learning) and Tikanga (school culture). In keeping with the previous year, we developed a Board workplan that strived to complete the second year of work that culminated in a full review of the school's policies. As a Board our governance is only as effective as the policies we set for the school, ensuring these are relevant and aligned has empowered the school's senior and middle leaders to make timely decisions.

The Board continues to work alongside the school's Business Manager (Beth Parsons, welcomed to the school this year and who brings with her a wealth of experience) to ensure that NPGHS gets the best value for its allocated property management funding. Much of the property funding this year has again been spent on essential roofing remediation throughout the school and fire safety improvements. We are pleased to see the

requirements and if any money allows, some classroom remediation. Financially the school has carefully managed the budget during the year, which was impacted by the reduced number of international students due to the global pandemic, to ensure the school remains in a good position.

Scotlands Hostel continues to enrich school life and is another selling point of the school. The hostel staff have done a wonderful job throughout the year and really make the hostel a warm and welcoming home for our students during

The one-off School Investment Package (SIP) funding initial plans were adapted as needs changed for this expenditure to focus on installing a new CCTV system across the campus, improving signage around the school, installing a sound system to support emergency evacuation renovations made to their hostel accommodation and we now have a

maintenance plan in place to ensure ongoing expenditure is identified to keep the hostel facilities well-maintained into

the Board collaborated with the SLT to redevelop the strategy for the school for the next three years. We are excited to share the draft strategy with our school community in Term 4 for consultation and input. Focus areas in the draft strategic plan include: nurturing engagement in learning and ensuring we provide access to equitable education that supports our students to strive for personal excellence. This is supported by giving life within the school to Te Tiriti o Waitangi (The Treaty of Waitangi) and sustaining a culture of connection and inclusion at school.



To all our staff at NPGHS, on behalf of the Board, we give our thanks and appreciation for all that you do. Your dedication and support of our students during a Covid-disrupted year has been incredible once again. The traditional Maori cloak known as the korowai, is symbolic of our kura. Every feather represents each individual who makes up our school and is what makes it so incredibly beautiful. Not one individual is more significant than another, every feather plays a significant role and is of the utmost importance in contributing to the intricate design of the korowai and this in turn reflects our kura. This design is incredibly unique and because of this, these differences are treasured and celebrated.

Stepping into the new year, there were many things that I hoped to embody and foster as a leader. Authenticity and humility being an example of this. To be present, to be real, to be humble, to be authentic. I believe this is what marks and sets apart a person from any other leader. I have been fortunate to have had many influential people in my life who have shaped and marked me as a leader. If there is one thing that has been made evident for me this year, is the fact that life is all about the people. School is all about the people. Without people, there is a significant part missing, they are the beating heart and the foundation of what we call school. Our people are what makes New Plymouth Girls' High School what it is.

There is significant value in fostering spaces where intentional conversation & korero can take place. These conversations look like diving a little deeper than normal, breaking through the surface and engaging on a deeper and more meaningful level. After lockdown I was reminded of the beauty that comes with being able to walk beside one another and to be able to encourage and empower each other. There is a Maori whakatauki that reads,

HE TANGATA, HE TANGATA, HE TANGATA - It is the people, it is the people, it is the people. IT WILL FOREVER AND ALWAYS

BE ABOUT THE PEOPLE. This captures the very essence of the 'WHY' behind everything at school, the passion, love and care that is poured into everything that is done.

Leadership is all about serving others, standing beside & not above them. There is a quote that I love and I believe it encapsulates this very well; "True leaders are in the business of assisting people to realise their full potential and in doing so they inspire excellence." I have found it to be such a joy to be able to walk beside so many girls, champion & encourage them. But more importantly, to just simply be present in what could be perceived as the seemingly mundane aspects of everyday school life.

It has been a privilege and honour to have been given this platform that has hopefully enabled me to inspire, encourage and empower the girls of our school, even if only a few. This role has enabled me to connect with girls from all year levels and completely different walks of life. Through forming connections with countless different people this year, I have discovered that all people just simply desire to be seen and to be heard... even if it is as simple as striking up a conversation with another girl at the bathroom sink. This sense of kotahitanga and whanaungatanga highlights the strong sense of belonging that is present within our school. I will forever be grateful for the way in which New Plymouth Girls' High School has shaped me into the person that I am today. It is a place where

As of writing this, a group of 15 of our committee members are partnering up with Sustainable Taranaki to spread awareness for the little blue penguin, and with that, we are hoping to make signs to spread awareness for penguin nesting along our coasts as well as planning both school-based and community beach clean-ups along the way.

And lastly, thank you so much to all the members of the Environment committee, and the passion and dedication you have brought to the group, this year truly wouldn't have happened without you, and we hope the young leaders within the committee will continue to be positive environmental changemakers within our community. 






Further success and celebrations that occurred this year were:


- Arts Week was celebrated by many students getting involved and participating in Pavement Art, Wearable Arts, and the ever-popular Avant Garde Hair Art.




Mathematics


Cases reported each day

The Mathematics Department has had a successful if somewhat interrupted year. We welcomed Mrs Colbourne back into the Department as a part time teacher, sharing her with Science and Physical Education. Ms Lynda Fromings became the school's Numeracy coordinator and for Term 2, Mrs Rutherford was Acting Deputy Principal whilst Mrs Tanya Harris stepped effortlessly into the Head of Mathematics role. Mrs Eileen Mott handed her resignation in after a very long teaching career, and we would like to thank her for all her contributions to the Maths Department as well as her involvement in the wider school.

Our staff continue to be actively involved in the Taranaki Mathematics Association (TMA) both on the administrative side and in attending meetings, organising professional learning or delivering presentations. Miss Jackie Crawford continues to be the current TMA secretary and has ensured that all communication is smooth and efficient, and along with Mr Andrew Bone they have helped finalise the plans for the 2021 Biennial New Zealand Association of Mathematics Teachers' Conference to be held in New Plymouth. Mrs Sandra Rutherford is on the Steering Committee for the Taranaki,

Manawatu and Hawkes Bay Network of Expertise which has received \$120,000 for professional learning in the region. A significant proportion of this has gone towards scholarships for the Maths Conference in October (all being well).

We would also like to thank Mrs Holly Jones for her support in running some extra-curricular activities during the year. She took six Year 12 students to the Massey Manawatu Mathematics & Statistics (M3S) competition as well as running lunchtime sessions helping students prepare for the Australian Mathematics and ICAS Maths competitions. Her enthusiasm, generosity and home baking have all been much appreciated by the students attending those sessions.

We were very pleased to have 2 Scholarships in Statistics. Congratulations must go to Darla Stroud-Bennett and an extra well done to Amy Simmers who achieved her Scholarship at the Outstanding level. Special thanks must also go to Mrs Helen Hofmans and Mr Andrew Bone for the huge amount of extra time and effort they put into preparing these students, often through before or after school classes as well as during the school holidays.

Our NCEA results were again pleasing and the Numeracy pass rate for our students sits at 92.4% at Year 11, 99.2% at Yr12 and 97.5% at Yr13. This reflects the dedication and hard work of both the teachers and the students. A special thank you must go to Ms Lynda Fromings for all the work she has done to help students at risk of not gaining Numeracy achieve their Numeracy Unit Standards through the extra sessions she puts on at the end of the year.

I would like to congratulate the whole department for their enthusiasm, dedication and commitment. They are an amazing team, and it is a pleasure to work alongside them. Special thanks must go to Mr Andrew Bone and Mrs Tanya Harris, who in their roles as Assistant HoD have been an immense source of support and encouragement for me. The whole team is a collaborative and collegial group of professionals who always have the students' best interests at heart. They are a very generous and tireless team who always go the extra mile.

Competitions and events: Maths & Science Week (20th – 24th September)

The major event for the year was Math and Science Week held at the end of September (the event was pushed further into the year due to Covid). Throughout the week, Tanya Bagga, the academic leader and her faithful Maths and Science committee organised and ran Science and Maths-related activities every day to promote the STEM curriculum. Tanya's aim was to increase turnout in Maths and Science week and make the challenges more difficult. Activities included a forensic murder mystery where students had to solve the "murder" of a teacher by analysing hair and fingerprint samples, an engineering challenge where students were given a limited number of popsicle sticks and blue tack to build a bridge, with the winning bridge supported the weight of someone standing on top of it! There was also a parachuting egg challenge and a marble rollercoaster challenge where students had to create the windiest, longest rollercoaster out of a set amount of cardboard. It was great to see everyone getting so involved in these challenges. Tanya and her team pulled off a very successful week and this is testament to their hard work and commitment

Mathematics Competitions

Each year some of our outstanding students gain significant results in a variety of competitions. Many others pitted their knowledge and skills against other students locally, nationally, and internationally. The benefits of entering these competitions are that students can: test their general mathematics knowledge against students from all over New Zealand; receive individual feedback on each question; track their progress over the years they enter and receive recognition for their efforts and achievements. Below are the top results of our students from these competitions. Even if a student did not make the list below, we encourage participation for enjoyments sake. Every student will at least receive a certificate of participation.

Australasian Mathematics Competition (AMC)

The Australian Mathematics competition is the original and largest of its kind in the world, with approximately 400,000 competitors. The competition consists of mainly multiple-choice questions involving problem solving. This competition still requires the students to compete using their mental arithmetic skills as calculators are not permitted. The awards are based on the students ranked score within their Year level.

Results have not yet been received due to COVID-19 related delays.

ICAS Mathematics Competition

The University of New South Wales ICAS competitions are also run in many countries in the Pacific region. From year to year each individual student can see their progress in relation to their year group in New Zealand as this is depicted graphically on their results certificate. In a similar style to the AMC, the big difference is that competitors are allowed the use of calculators. The questions are still challenging though!

Results have not yet been received due to COVID-19 related delays.

Otago University Junior Mathematics Competition

This competition is usually tackled by those with a passion for problem solving in Years 9 to 11. Earning a Merit certificate is quite an accomplishment and gaining Distinction is outstanding. Even if a student did not earn one of these certificates, it is encouraging to see them take on the challenge and maybe have some fun while doing so.

Technology

Design and Visual Communications

I am penning this report during our first 2021 lock down. As I reflect on this past year and the last 14 plus year's I am amazed at how the time has gone! Thinking back on this year's Year 9 DVC students I have been amazed at their inherent ability to sketch and sketch well with skill and tremendous attention to detail. Moreover, they have also completed some stunning colour work, and design work with the product design- jewelry/ watch unit of work also with the spatial interior design work.

Year 10 have pursued the study and subsequent influence of a chosen designer. This has been applied to the Perfume Bottle design work and to the spatial design assignment of a Small House. We have seen some very accomplished colour rendering which as contributed to a Level 1 achievement standard. Level 1 DVC again applying the influence of a chosen designer so that it will impact their own design work in both the Lighting solution(product) and subsequently with the I-Site spatial design. Final design outcomes were drawn three dimensionally as architectural presentation drawings to showcase.

Level 2 DVC have researched a chosen design era/movement and again applied this influence on their Art Gallery design. The product design is a reception desk for the gallery which is the blending of materials, fittings, ergonomics, and ideation to create a piece of furniture as an art form. The final spatial design is also redrawn by using mechanical perspective which is a wonderful vehicle to showcase an architectural outcome.

Level 3 DVC commenced the year with a design exploration assignment. This process allows the students to explore by sketching, drawing, and modelling a theme from the natural world or from the built environment. This develops design thinking skills and assists in the process of generating ideas from pattern, texture, shapes, and forms- this is really the basis of designing. Throughout the year we have pursued a spatial solution to include orientation to site, light and sun ingress, sustainable energy systems and of course materials. The product design assignment is a designer's chair- or a design issue based around improving the quality of someone's life through measurement, testing, ergonomics, and the application of mechanical fittings.

This is my last year of teaching so after 38 years I bid you all farewell. I have enjoyed my time teaching at Girls' High School and will have many fond memories of students I have taught, the amazing creative outcomes through your design and drawing work and with the great staff I have worked with over this time. It has been fun and a privilege. Thank you.

Digital Technologies

2021 has been a yet another busy year and our digital technology students have continued to create amazing outcomes across all levels of the subject.

The Year 13 students undertook and independent project to generate a digital media outcome. This has resulted in variety of projects such as an app to help students with dyslexia, JavaScript based quiz for junior students, a responsive website that contains an interactive map of the school and an animation based around understanding autism.

In Year 12, they have been busy focusing on learning about networking protocols and creating a network to host a dedicated for gaming club, they then generated designs to promote gaming club for print production outcome. To



finish out the year the students have been designing and creating a responsive website that displays on both mobile and desktop devices.

Year 11 students have focused on developing their design skills within the digital context. This year they have worked on gathering data so they could then produce a digitally designed infographic where they had to gather the data. The students have also acquired understanding of human to computer interfaces by generating concepts to develop their own websites.



Year 10 have been studying a broad range of subjects which started with 3d sculpting of mythological creatures and characters. They then developed websites by coding from scratch with HTML and CSS. This was followed on by an introduction to 2D animation in After Effects in which they generated animations promoting positivity and lastly worked collaboratively on a smart home construction project in Minecraft.



Year 9 students undertake digital technologies as one of the core Technology subjects. This 'taster' course runs for approximately 10 weeks and provides students with the opportunity to develop their skills. This year they have been learning about correct procedures and conventions associated with file management, basic networking, IP addresses, tools and skills in Adobe Illustrator with 2D character design and then creating a game in Scratch with that character.

I would like to acknowledge our two IT Technicians, Mr. Kurt Brookes and Mr. Doug Gelling for their on-going support for the students and the Digital Technologies Department.

Welcome to a snapshot of another 'new' year in the department. I love the word 'new' as we have new classes and new students. It only seems like yesterday that classes commenced in the department with students eagerly entering R6 and R7 for Food and Nutrition or Level 1 and 2 Hospitality and R8 for Textiles Technology. So began another incredibly busy, enriching and rewarding year of firsts, fun, food, fabric, and fashion for our students. Not to forget the delicious aromas that waffle through R Block and have a variety of other teachers and ground staff popping their

heads through the open windows and doors to find the source of them!

Within those initial weeks Scholarship results were announced with an Outstanding Scholarship attained by Tayla Manning for her Textiles Technology project in 2020. Congratulations to Tayla and Mrs Colleen Horne, her teacher, as an immense amount of commitment, work and time was undertaken to gain this stunning result.

All Food and Nutrition students have the opportunity, to develop health enhancing attitudes with kai. In the junior

school "Healthy eating habits last a lifetime " is the focus for all Year 9 students who have one spell each week. It is always wonderful to observe these students work as a team, gaining confidence and skills in the preparation of kai. With people in general being time poor, possibly thinking nutritious food is expensive and the rising rate of Obesity and Type 2 Diabetes, Year 10 gain skills in applying their nutritional knowledge to meet the needs of their whanau and themselves. On this journey they are interpreting information on food packing, how the save money and time when planning meals, shopping for food, and preparing and nutritious cooking meals for whanau.

The senior Food and Nutrition students explore the nutritional issues facing various groups in society and developed health enhancing strategies to address them. Level 1 students gain insight into the personal, inter-personal and societal influences on food choice and their effect on well-being. Food safety practices are challenged, and strategies developed to address food handling issues in the community.

Sustainable food practices using local food were evaluated by Level 2 students. They had the opportunity to make and use a variety of preserves. Veganism is explored and how a family could meet their food needs both at home and when out in the community. The students challenge the topic of "New Zealand families are making poor food choices at mealtimes" that can lead to obesity and are able to refute it by their research.

The Level 1 Hospitality classes have shown some great skills in their practical lessons, preparing, and presenting a variety of dishes that showcased their skills learnt working with eggs, cheese, meat, fruit, and vegetables. They learnt the difference between the many different sauces, and how to improve the flavour and visual appeal of a dish, showcasing their Bechamel in their baked macaroni and cheese dish. The students tried different preparation methods and raising agents to change textures in cakes, sponges, and scones.

The Level 2 Hospitality classes have also shown some great skills in their practical lessons, preparing, and presenting a variety of dishes that showcased their skills learnt about different cooking methods, such as frying, roasting and grilling. A highlight for them was the Unit on preparing and presenting sandwiches for service. They enjoyed making and presenting panini, open sandwiches, club, and simple BLT's. With this practical based programme, the students can feel prepared for a job, further study or a career based in the hospitality industry if they wish to pursue it.

There was a riot of colour and pattern in the Textiles Technology room this year when Year 9 students started designing and making their own patchwork cushions. Students rose to the challenge of learning to use the sewing machine, and applying their newfound sewing skills, to create unique and beautiful cushion covers to take home to decorate their rooms.

Year 10 students were very busy bees this year, growing their sewing skills by completing sewing challenges and projects. Term One and Two involved making themselves a Sewing Bag and Pyjamas. The Term 3 and 4 project involved showing skill and creativity to create a Sweatshirt featuring an applied design. The students practiced different methods of applying design such as screen printing, applique, and embroidery. Hand embroidery proved a very popular technique for creating some exquisite designs for decorating their sweatshirts.

Level 1 Textiles Technology students demonstrated excellent accuracy of skills and efficient use of class time, to complete the "Carry On" Bag Unit in Term One. The Prototype project in Term Two generated a wide range of sewing projects such as formal dresses, jumpers, bags, winter jackets, pants, skirts, leggings, and children's clothing. These projects helped stretch their skills and enabled them to develop an understanding of the importance of selecting the most suitable materials and sewing techniques.

Level 2 students stepped up their skills to demonstrate complex sewing procedures for the Tailored Shirt sewing challenge. Sustainability was the theme for the Prototype project requiring students to reflect on how they could design and make a garment using ethical and sustainable practices. Pants, dresses, skirts, swimwear, a quilt and jacket were completed after trialling and testing of materials and techniques.

Mrs Horne is very proud of the determination, commitment and perseverance shown by all the Textiles Technology students to develop their skills and use their time and materials responsibly.

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Social Sciences

As Social Scientists we continue to explore significant events that happen in society. This year we have seen impacts on the environment because of floods, bushfires and earthquakes. We have witnessed political upheaval in Afghanistan and the continual ramifications of Covid-19. These events have allowed our students to have robust discussions in class as we develop their awareness of the world around us.

This year we welcomed Miss Kimberley Bellas and Mrs Sophie Lamb to the department. In Term Three we also welcomed Mr Callum Harris. They have joined Ms. Eugenie Petrove, Ms Karen Conybeer, Mr Jeff Sanders, Mrs Kat Coleman, Miss Kelsey Dempster, Mrs Rebecca Crowe, Mr Tony Smith, Mrs Stella Bond and Mr Jim Graham. All have had made positive contributions to our students' education.

Our 2020 NCEA data was rewarding, thanks to the hard work by students and teachers. This reflects the on-going commitment of the team to develop courses that enable learning in and out of the classroom. The Department achieved pleasing percentage pass rates for NCEA across the Social Science subjects as well as the number of students gaining 14 plus credits. We continues to develop different ways to facilitate learning as well as assisting students to overcome the challenge of assessment, to manage, resources, be prepared academically and have the confidence to be able to succeed. The Department was pleased with the data analysis and was happy to report that we achieved grades and pass rates higher than other similar schools in the country.

A special mention must go to the following students (and their teachers) for achieving Scholarship last year. Mercy Jones and Eva Hilliam, as Year 12 students, as well as Tessa Barry gained Scholarship in Geography. Grace Newland, as a Year 12 student, Savithi Gunasinghe and Melanie Bishop gained Scholarship in Media Studies. Melanie Bishop also gained Scholarship in History. In 2021 our focus in the junior school was to develop a programme for Year 10 that would engage students by designing topics relevant to them. This included the role of social media in their lives and looking at pandemics that have changed the world. We continue to incorporate New Zealand History into our programme and our Year 10 students welcomed Maata Wharehoka from Parihaka again this year to learn about the 1881 invasion. In 2022 we are hoping to take all our Year 10 students to visit Parihaka.

For our senior programme we have begun to look at the new NCEA Level One Achievement Standards that are to be introduced in 2023. Teacher Only Days have allowed us time to review these changes. Our next step is to plan how we will be implementing these new standards into our courses.

2022 looks even more promising as numbers in subjects continue to grow. Meanwhile the ancient precursor to our modern democracy, the political life that developed in Athens over the fifth century BCE has astounded with its modern focus on the inclusion of all citizens in government and its

Geography

2021 has been a year of change and reflection for us all. Geography skills and knowledge are increasingly important for our future citizens and leaders to have as nations look to solve environmental, social, and economic problems in a sustainable manner. We need more Geographers in the future.

The Level One classes continued to investigate the issues when people use the environment, both locally (Waiwhakaiho River) and overseas (The Great Barrier Reef). Students compared the international response to the Covid pandemic and how population data is important to identify possible impacts and solutions. Finally, students investigated how we prepare and respond to natural events which we are seeing become more important with the increase in floods, bushfires, and storms around the world. For the second year the trip to the Great Barrier Reef was not able to occur and we wait for higher vaccination rates and international travel to continue the trip to Cairns when it is safe to do so.

A new topic on Climate Change was introduced in Level Two to increase students' understanding of our changing world. New Plymouth's residential patterns and changes were researched and presented in effective ways. The Amazon rainforest continued to be explored following the theme of understanding how important large environments are around the globe.

The Level Three class continued to study development along the coastline and this year were we fortunate to have more support in their research with a visit to Pukeariki, and a guest speaker Michael Kevanugh (the author of Back to Front – a book on the history of the Coastal Walkway). The class explored migration issues in Europe and a model EU meeting, this looks like it will continue with the rise in tensions in Afghanistan and parts of Africa. The class analysed the impacts on tourism in Rotorua and globally.

Teachers continue to review and reflect on our practices. The team looked at how internal assessment were offered to students. This year all the assessment were issued through TEAMS and this allowed the assessment to be completed by student both in the class and at home. It allowed students to explore wider issues and therefore we noticed an improvement in results.

Thank you to Mrs. Katrine Coleman and Miss Kelsey Dempster for their valuable input into continuing to develop the Geography programme to meet the needs and interests of our future leaders and decision makers.

Economics

Our 2021 Economics classes were full of fabulous students who really wanted to understand why things develop the way they do in the Economy and society in general. Economics in general is a "real life" subject that looks at what is going on right now and is all about connections and the big picture. Our students were able to understand how Taranaki is locally and globally connected – for example how a Covid lockdown overseas in China impacts the price of washings machines at Noel Leeming around the corner.

Level 1 concentrated on how human behaviour influences the markets and why and what happens when the Government gets involved. We analysed decision making and how different decision impact each other. Students investigated a business of their choice, noticing how the need for profit must be balanced with protecting the environment and people. Students also looked at real life current economic decisions that were being made by Governments/District Council/Board of Trustees from e.g., whether the electric car rebates should have been offered to whether water meters should be installed in New Plymouth to whether more counsellors should be funded at NPGHS. The Level 1s have worked very hard and can be proud of what they have managed to achieve.

Economics at Level 2 is the first opportunity for students to really dig into Macro Economics. Students concentrated on how Economic models reflect real life events in the NZ Economy – such as the economic impact of Covid-19 on Growth, Inflation and Employment – and how the Government intervenes for better living standards for all. We looked particularly at how employment indicators don't necessarily tell the whole picture and answered questions such as "Who is affected more by Unemployment – the young or the old" and whether Covid-19 impacts men and women differently. Level 2 Economics is always a huge learning curve and this year's class can be very proud of themselves.

Level 3 Economics is back to Micro Economics. The year began with Economic Simulations, for example unsuspecting students consuming copious numbers of donuts to demonstrate Decreasing Marginal Utility or running around the classroom with tennis balls to better understand Diminishing Returns. We investigated what might happen to New Zealanders (both consumers and producers) whenever the Government intervenes in the market. Another big focus this year was on the difference between Equality and Equity with a look at Child Poverty and how everyone can better off economically if we don't have child poverty in NZ. The 2021 Level 3 Economics class has been outstanding – hard working, far-seeing and fun. We will miss them and wish them all the best in their future endeavours. Remember: never forget the Why?!

Awhina Learning Centre

2021 has been a positive year of consolidation and steady progress for both the staff and students at the Awhina Learning Centre. Our Awhina team of nine, two teachers and seven learning assistants, has continued to effectively support 150 students, either in the mainstream setting or at the Awhina Learning Centre.

Kim Cribb, our new Awhina Learning Centre teacher, has brought increased fun and laughter to Awhina with her crazy sense of humour and her cheeky laugh. She has continued to design individualized or small group programs to successfully develop our Awhina based students' literacy, numeracy, and life skills by incorporating agentic learning, technology, community involvement and art and music into their daily activities. Ukulele, the drums, and singing have become an integral part of the life-skills program and visits this year have included an animation lesson at the Govett Brewster Art Gallery and a trip to see the Royal New Zealand Ballet. The students also help with the care of the two aged Awhina goldfish (9 and 16 years) with research on care and trips to the pet shop as necessary. We are very fortunate that our Awhina based students now have five new laptops and headphone sets that have been provided by the Covid19 Education fund to use for their individualized programs. As well as designing programs for our Awhina based students Kim works effectively with students in the mainstream who require extra support in specific subjects. She has also ably supported and whole heartedly encouraged the Pasifika group of students who practice in Awhina at lunchtimes.

Despite the recurrence of Covid19 our SPEC students have achieved very good results this year. Most of our students who have attended for the full year in 1 SPEC have gained 23 NCEA Level 1 credits, and in 2SPEC they have gained 21 NCEA Level 2 credits. Both classes have been a pleasure to work with this year due to their perseverance and their steady work habits. Currently we have 52 senior SAC students and 15 junior students who are provided with Special Assessment Conditions in a variety of forms that include reader/ writer assistance, computer assistance, extra time, and separate accommodation.

Our very experienced and dedicated learning assistants work hard to support students either within whole classes, small groups of students within classes or at Awhina, or individual students in class or in Awhina. Where they are placed is dependent on the needs of the individual student or group

of students. The amazing Awhina 2021 team of learning assistants consists of Keren Bolger, Sharon Church, Kerry Johanson, Glenda Kerr, Deepti Khanolkar, Kirsten Probyn and Jenny Saunders.

Last year's Teacher Aide Pay Equity Claim was a major step in acknowledging the professional nature of the role of learning assistants in our schools where their pay rate was increased, and money was placed in a fund to allow learning assistants free professional development in areas of their choice. Our Awhina learning assistants have taken up this opportunity and in their own time are studying a range of subjects such as Te Reo, Introduction to SPELD, the Teenage Brain and the Autistic Spectrum.

To every member of our Awhina team – thank you for your genuine care and awhi of our students and for your dedication and expertise in supporting their learning and wellbeing. It continues to be a real privilege to lead the Awhina team.

On behalf of the Awhina team, our thanks to the Senior Management Team for your support of our department and of our students. Thanks too, to Brett McFarlane, our Line manager for his wise advice which has helped us to streamline our systems and set up Kamar so we can disseminate information to staff. Also, many, many thanks to our awesome team of Deans who work tirelessly to support our Awhina students and all students at NPGHS.

We welcomed two new students into the Waimarie class of 2021 - Paige from Frankley and Molly via Salisbury in Nelson. Both girls add fresh personality and loads of talent to the group. Michelle has continued to be a valued role model and helper, Helaina has inspired our wonderful Makaton sign language journey, Aliyah and Joe both resonate with pure hearts and capacity to learn, while Faith has provided countless moments of pure joy. It's fantastic to have our recent graduate Taryn coming back as our part-time adult student. Working in partnership with whanau is a privilege. We sincerely appreciate our committed parents and the bonds we have maintained. Our thoroughly professional Waimarie staff deserve huge credit. They genuinely love their work while continuing to be resilient, flexible, and very supportive of each other. They are absolute legends!

There are exciting times ahead for Waimarie. Two extension "wings" are being added to the existing building and a refurbishment of the current space will follow. A new "break-away classroom" will help to accommodate the diverse needs of our co-hort. An accessible kitchen will transform our capacity for cooking lessons and the upgraded bathroom suite will be a gamechanger! Our much-loved sensory garden will have a complete makeover as well, including lots of edibles to nourish our life-skills approach to learning.

Waimarie students make their way in this world with a wide range of complex needs. They are neuro-diverse, can have physical disabilities or health conditions, and often have dual vision and hearing impairments. Most are non-verbal. But just like any teenager, they all have an intrinsic need to be heard, make their own choices and develop their own identity. We proudly represented this sentiment at the Taranaki Hikoi of Hope in March to highlight the realties and challenges people with disabilities face. In the classroom, Waimarie staff use a myriad of tools to become communication partners. We teach students to use talking iPads, to use picture symbols, to gesture or eyepoint to "Yes/No" tags and to use "switch" buttons to activate speakers, computers, or appliances. This year our dedicated staff have also risen to the challenge of learning NZ Makaton sign language. Helping our students have a voice is at the heart of everything we do.

Upskilling has also extended to learning more about Mātauranga Māori (Māori knowledge). Staff received awesome professional development with Rangimokai Knuckey and Jo Thompson-Garret. We are also grateful for ongoing support from Whaea Unity Wara. Increasing our use of Te Reo and being more inclusive with kawa (cultural practices) and tikanga (cultural principles) has led to our most authentic 'Matariki Puanga Celebration Lunch' to date. The Waimarie students hosted our friends from the Māori Performing Arts class who performed for our manuhiri (guests). We then all feasted on vegetable soups made at Waimarie and the amazing baked treats from the Maaka whanau. Our collaborative Matariki star cluster sculpture still takes pride of place in the unit.

With the support of Juliet Woller (HoD Music), we have loved having weekly music sessions with the multi-talented Julian Raphael. We have sung, "signed" and drummed up a storm - paving the way for an inclusive concert - playing with Julian and the NZ Chamber Music artists at the TSB Showplace. Our Arts curriculum is also extended with the supportive leadership of our Dance teacher Abby McCrae. Everyone leaves her class with a massive smile and rush of endorphins. Waimarie students also thoroughly enjoy attending classes in the very inclusive Visual Arts Department. Sport Taranaki's 'Moveables' gym class, led by Gymnastica coach Jodi is another great challenge for our students. The volunteer team at Riding for the Disabled are our heroes as well.

Their fundraising efforts have resulted in the much-needed new covered arena, a huge asset for the community and three of our students. A highlight this year, was receiving a Tu Manawa grant from Sport Taranaki to purchase an assortment of sport equipment. We can now regularly set up obstacle courses and have exercise sessions to support gross motor skill development. We also wish to thank Deputy Principal Brett McFarlane for his help during the year.





Outdoor Adventure



Hillary Challenge

The Hillary Challenge is a 5-day event that is known as the toughest secondary school event in New Zealand. The top 12 teams from around New Zealand come to compete in this challenge in the Tongariro National Park every year.

Serious Hillary squad trainings began at the start of Term 3. We trained together 5-6 times a week. Trainings during the

week involved gym sessions, sprint trainings, problem solving challenges and kayaking. Saturdays involved 4+ hour run/hike missions on the mountain with large packs.

Two weeks before Hillary, the squad did a two-day expedition on the Mount Taranaki. We hiked 16km up the Stoney River in the afternoon and camped in a tent fly overnight outside Holly hut. The next day, the squad conquered the 8 Peaks of the Pouakai ranges travelling a distance of 35km and over 2000 vertical metres that day. For the two weeks after that, the team rested and tapered to get ready for the big final.

The day before the Hillary Challenge began, the team travelled to the Hillary Outdoors Education Centre in the Tongariro National Park. We met some of the other teams, got settled into our accommodation, and were briefed on what we could expect for the week.

Day 1 and 2 consisted of 12 problem-solving initiatives (Each an hour-long) that the team had to complete to gain as many points as we could. The 12 teams rotated around these challenges and teams completed them individually, so we did not know how we were doing in comparison with the other teams. Some of the challenges included kayaking as many laps as possible around a set course, a bike time trial up a hill, making a catapult, caving, high ropes, a first aid scenario, running with heavy objects around a course etc. These initiatives were a test of how well the team could work together to problem solve whilst testing us both physically and mentally.

On Wednesday morning all the teams piled into their vans and the drivers were told to drive to Whakapapa Village for the teams to begin the expedition. Mr Hewlett (our team manager from NPBHS) was given the results from the first two days to read out to the team. We all held our breath as we prepared as we had no idea how we had done. Mr Hewlett however let out a big woohoo! He told us that we were coming 1st. The team cheered, laughed, cried, and hugged each other. We were elated! We knew that we still had to push hard over the next couple of days though because we were only ahead by 71 points.

The weather forecast included snow to 800m and gale-force wind, so we knew it was going to be a memorable expedition. The expedition is a two-day Rogaine where teams try to





navigate their way to as many checkpoints as possible. When we started it was gently snowing and all the trees had white blankets. As we began to collect checkpoints, the weather cleared, and we had beautiful mountain views. The navigators planned a route to get as many checkpoints as possible and were constantly discussing the fastest way to get between points and where exactly we should mark the checkpoints.

With two hours to go it started to hail and the wind came gusting horizontally. The hail pelted into us, turning our skin red. We formed a line and watched the feet in front of ours as we continued over tussock hills. We found a snowy campsite in the trees and set up our fly. We appreciated warm clothes and food, but it was difficult to imagine waking up to the freezing snow to start running again in the morning.

All the same, early Thursday morning we woke up to put on our frozen boots and set off into the winter wonderland. 10 hours later we ran down the ridge to the finish. It's hard to explain what those hours were like: there were laughter and tears, snow sliding and bush bashing, amazing views and life-time memories.

After strapping ankles, moisturising sunburns, and massaging tight muscles, we woke up on Friday morning with only 50km of running, biking, and paddling to go. Those 4 hours were a blur of towing and pushing each other, swallowing energy gels, and doing whatever we could to go faster. We ran into the finish line in first place, finishing off one of the most epic weeks of our lives.

Some of the challenges that we had to complete included knot tying, archery, setting up a tent, first aid and puzzles. These were great activities that required us to concentrate even though we were already exhausted at that point.

Once we had finished as many of those challenges as we could before 12 hours was up, we ran to the finish line and completed the race. It felt good to know we had finally reached the end and I got an awesome sense of achievement knowing I had completed it to the best of my ability.

NPGHS teams did exceptionally well across the three events. The Senior team competing in the 12-hour event, consisting of Abby Carver, Mercy Jones, Bree Drinkwater and Caeley Hattle were the top finishing female team and came in 4th overall. 
