THE PASTORAL NETWORK

The Pastoral Network includes the Principal, Deputy Principals, Waka Kaitiaki & Waka Amo (Deans), Kāwai Huia Teachers, Guidance Counsellors, Nurse, Careers Counsellor, HoD Awhina Learning Centre and Resource Teacher of Learning & Behaviour. As a team, their role is to support and assist students through any personal, vocational or educational difficulties. Our prime concern is caring for the needs of individual students and supporting their learning.

WAI ORA WELLNESS CENTRE

Services available at the Wai Ora Wellness Centre include counselling, general health concerns, health education and promotion, and referral to other services. The Guidance Counsellors, together with our Nurse, are available daily for students to make appointments or for parents to make contact with them. The Public Health Nurse and Adolescent Health Clinic are also situated within the Wai Ora Wellness Centre for students to access each week.



AWHINA LEARNING CENTRE



The Awhina Learning Centre (ALC) is located in C Block which is beside the school hall and adjacent to Drama Room 1.

Based at the Awhina Learning Centre is a team of seven learning assistants and two teachers who work together to help students make the most of their opportunities at New Plymouth Girls' High School.

Providing a safe, positive environment, the Awhina Learning Centre offers a range of support to students, staff and parents. Varied tests are used to determine students' learning needs and programmes are then tailored to the individual requirements of the students. Programs include computer programs, individualized subject support and small group support for literacy and numeracy.

Students are referred to the Awhina Learning Centre by previous schools, teachers, counsellors, parents and through self-referral. The Learning Support team is based at the Awhina Learning Centre. "Awhina" means help and support and our goal for all our GHS students is that no student should be left behind.

CURRICULUM

Year 9 - All students study all Learning Areas

Arts, English, Health & Physical Education, Languages, Mathematics, Science, Social Science, Technology and Te Reo Māori

Within some Learning Areas there is a choice among subjects:

Arts (Dance, Drama, Music, Visual Arts or Digital Visual Arts) Students can only choose Visual Arts or Digital Visual Arts, not both, Languages (English Language, French, Literacy, Spanish), Technologies (Nature of Technology, Design Technology, Design & Visual Communication, Digital Technology, Robotics or Textiles Technology)

Students may be placed in one or more of the following subjects to support their learning needs: Literacy or Numeracy

Year 10 - All students study FIVE Learning Areas:

English, Health & Physical Education, Mathematics, Science and Social Science

Students are able to select THREE options from the following:

Animal & Plant Science, Business Studies, Dance, Design Technology, Design & Visual Communication, Digital Technology, Digital Visual Arts, Drama, Food and Nutrition, French, Music, Spanish, Sports Education, Sustainability, Te Reo Māori, Textiles Technology and Visual Arts

Students may be placed in Literacy and/or Numeracy to support their learning needs. (NCEA Level 1 courses with students are an option for students whom this challenge is appropriate).

Year 11 - Students select SIX subjects.

Compulsory Subjects:

English, Mathematics and a Science **AND**

Students select THREE options from a list of approximately 27 subjects.

Year 12 - Students select SIX subjects.

Students should study the Curriculum Booklet for details on

the most appropriate subjects and levels according to their skills, interests, abilities and potential future career direction.

Compulsory Subject:

English

AND

Students select FIVE options from a list of approximately 39 subjects

OR

Students may choose 'Shape your Future' an integrated project-based course including English.

ΔND

Students select FOUR options from a list of 39 subjects.

Year 13 - Students select a full course of FIVE subjects and also have a study line.

Students select all of their subjects from a list of approximately 44 subjects

OR

Students may choose 'Shape your Future' an integrated project-based course including English.

AND

Students select THREE options from a list of approximately 44 subjects.

NCEA Levels 1, 2 & 3 - Senior students can select courses from any NCEA level appropriate to their ability. Please note the preferred prior learning.

Alternative or more practically based courses are available in some subject areas. This range of specialist alternative courses includes a SPEC learning support programme. Timetabled and supplementary Vocational Training opportunities are available to senior students at NCEA Levels 1, 2, 3 and higher.

All Year 11, 12 and 13 students have 1 spell per week alternating between Mahi Tahi (Life Skills) and Wellbeing Programmes.

Boarding at Te Kura Taitamawāhine O Puke Ariki - Scotlands Hostel provides a warm, welcoming and supportive environment where students are encouraged to do well academically and participate fully in school and hostel life. WAIMARIE COMPLEX AND HIGH NEEDS CENTRE



The guiding philosophy is to enable these unique students to reach their full potential by offering age and developmental stage appropriate learning opportunities.

Waimarie is the Complex and High Needs Centre specifically designed to provide an educational setting for students with physical and/or intellectual disabilities. This is achieved through the provision of a multi-sensory and life-skills based curriculum and may include physical or occupational therapy.

A partnership with New Plymouth Boys' High School provides opportunities for boys with complex and very high needs to also attend Waimarie.

Opportunities for involvement with mainstream peers and classes are utilised when appropriate. The students in Waimarie have much to offer those in the wider school. Community engagement is also a key part of the Waimarie programmes with students regularly participating with local organisations such as WITT, Riding for the Disabled, Sport Taranaki, Moveables, Sailability, TSSSA and Special Olympics events.
