At the end of last term, we were very pleased to introduce Stymie to NPGHS, and you possibly saw the introduction message on the school app. Stymie is an anonymous reporting tool that helps students look out for those around them and to feel empowered to ask for help. We have been very pleased with the responsible way our students are using this tool and it has already made a difference to individuals and groups of students. At the same time as launching Stymie, we also held presentations from Netsafe for leaders, students, staff, and whānau. Unfortunately, the whānau presentation was not as well attended as we had expected, particularly since families often ask us how to manage device use at home, or keep their children safe online, or how to respond to difficult virtual situations. The Student Council have provided feedback from a student perspective, and we are now working together to finalise the next steps. Behaviour in toilets

You might have heard from your daughter or young person that there are a small number of students who misuse the toilets at school. It means some of our students avoid using the bathrooms while at school. We want students to feel safe using the toilets for their intended purpose and the sort of behaviour shown by those misusing the bathrooms is never acceptable. Thankfully most of our students act sensibly in the bathrooms.

You will already know that we took steps to install CCTV and we have noticed a reduction in group behaviours. Unfortunately, there are still some individuals who act in a way that is not acceptable and we are working to eliminate this individual behaviour too.

We have consequences and disciplinary action for those that are caught and, after extensive advertising, we have a new staff member who has joined us and will take a lead role in making sure that students who are in the bathrooms for the wrong reasons are moved back to class or outside. In the interim, we have had a committed group of staff who have been there reducing the inappropriate use of the bathrooms.

We have also taken some very proactive steps which have all had a gradual but positive impact. At the end of last term we introduced the anonymous alert system, Stymie, that students can use to report this sort of behaviour, as well as any other concerns they might have. We have also refurbished the N Block toilets to provide a more welcoming and pleasant space for the vast majority of students who just want to use the toilet. There are also period product dispensers in each bathroom space, and while they were initially misused, the novelty seems to have worn off and students are very appreciative of these.

Sadly, in talking with other Principals, I am aware that this is a problem in a number of schools. At NPGHS are doing all we can to eliminate the behaviour and re-educate students, and that includes reminding students about appropriate bathroom behaviour. As we know, the difficulty is that it is hard to change the perception once a space has a bad name, and the actions of a few can impact many. We are aware that it isn't perfect yet, and probably won't ever be perfect, but we are told by students that there has been a significant improvement and they feel far more comfortable in the toilets. If your daughter experiences poor behaviour in a school bathroom block, we hope she will use Stymie to make a report, or will let a teacher know straight away if there are concerns. Teachers are all aware and are acting to help students too.

Thank you to those of you who contacted us to ensure we knew of these issues. We appreciate your support and knowing that we are acting on something that is important to families is affirming for us too.
