Our People, Our Place

The Central New Plymouth Kāhui Ako is made up of six New Plymouth Schools: 3 Primary schools, 1 Intermediate and 2 Secondary Schools. As of 1 July 2022, the total roll of the Kāhui Ako was 4,417, made up of NZ / Pakeha 2882 (65%), Māori 1032 (23%), Pacific 110 (2.5%), Asian 263 (5.9%) and others 142 (3.5%). All the schools are within the Te Atiawa iwi boundary.

Whakawhanaungatanga - getting into our schools

It has been an absolute pleasure this term getting into all of schools that make up our Kāhui Ako. I have been able to meet with all Principals to hear their stories of how their year has started and to gather their whakaaro and questions about our Kāhui Ako and our Achievement Challenges:

Across School Leaders
